Turning Off Your Phone: Is It Getting Harder?

Have you noticed that it now takes two hands to turn off your cell phone? With recent updates—on both Android and iPhone—the simple one-button shutdown has become a bit more complicated. Fortunately, there are easier alternatives that don't require holding multiple buttons at once.

Below are quick tips for both Android and iPhone users.

Android: Quick Way to Power Off

1. Swipe down from the upper right corner of your screen.
2. Look for the power icon in the menu.
3. Tap it to Power Off or Restart your phone.

Just a couple of swipes—no need to press and hold two buttons.

🍏 iPhone: Quick Way to Power Off

1. Open the Settings app.
2. Scroll down and tap General.
3. Scroll to the bottom and select Shut Down.
4. Slide to power off.

This avoids the newer two-button method and can be done one-handed.

African American History Facts

Editor's Note: The following article contains graphic historical accounts of physical violence, systemic abuse, and sexual assault. These details are shared not to sensationalize, but to accurately honor the immense courage and survival of those who endured the unthinkable.

Unbroken: The Bizarre and Beautiful Defiance of the Stolen

History is often taught as a series of dry dates, but the reality of the African American struggle is filled with stories so outrageous they sound like fiction—until you realize they were fueled by pure, unyielding grit. From a man who literally stole a Confederate ship to a woman who successfully sued her kidnapper a century before the Civil Rights Movement, these heroes didn't just survive; they pulled off the impossible. Prepare to be stunned by the audacity and the absolute triumph of these six extraordinary souls.

- **Henrietta Wood (c. 1818–1912):** After being kidnapped and sold back into slavery as a free woman, she did the unthinkable by suing her captor and winning a \$2,500 settlement in 1878. She remains the only person known to have successfully sued for and received individual reparations for her enslavement, using the funds to send her son to law school.
- **Mae Louise Walls Miller (1943–2014):** In a gut-wrenching 1961 escape, Miller fled a Mississippi plantation where her family was held in literal, "modern-day" chattel slavery nearly a century after the Civil War. They were whipped, hunted by dogs, and sexually violated by the landowners, making her eventual flight through the woods and her testimony to the Department of Justice a staggering victory over a nightmare that wouldn't die.
- **Robert Smalls (1839–1915):** In the middle of the Civil War, Smalls pulled off a move so bold it feels like a movie: he hijacked the CSS Planter, a Confederate ship, disguised himself as the captain, and sailed his family right past the enemy to freedom. He didn't just escape; he became a naval hero and eventually a U.S. Congressman.
- **Elizabeth Freeman "Mum Bett" (c. 1742–1829):** After hearing the words "all men are born free and equal" from the Massachusetts Constitution, she walked to a lawyer's office and sued for her freedom in 1781. She won, effectively bringing an end to slavery in the entire state through the sheer power of her own logic.
- **Cudjo Lewis (c. 1841–1935):** As a survivor of the Clotilda, the last illegal slave ship to reach the U.S. in 1860, his life was a bridge between two worlds. He survived the Middle Passage and the Civil War to help found **Africatown**, Alabama, a vibrant community where he spent the rest of his long life speaking his native tongue and preserving his culture.
- **Mary (c. 1800–unknown) and Polly (c. 1820–unknown):** This mother and daughter duo took on the Missouri legal system in the 1830s, winning two separate "freedom suits" by proving they had lived in free territory. Their victory is a heartwarming reminder that even in a rigged system, a mother's determination to free her child can move mountains.

These stories are a gut-punch of reality, but they leave you with a grin because they prove that the human spirit is far more resilient than any chain. They remind us that even in the darkest chapters of history, there were individuals who looked at the impossible and said, "Not today."
